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


MOVIE SCREENING- INDIA'S DAUGHTER

The 2012 gang rape and murder of Jyoti Singh, a 23-year-old medical student in Delhi, India, sparked a nationwide outcry against an entire culture's system abuse and dehumanization of women. Delving into the horrific particulars of that case, Leslee Udwin's hour-long activist documentary "India's Daughter" is sadly necessary to watch, and its protestors' call for gender equality. If Udwin's dramatic reconstruction of events at times goes from sensitive toward sensationalist, her unflinching access to her subjects offers chilling insight into the minds of men who are taught, at an early age, to view women with contempt that can escalate easily into lethal aggression.

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
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MOVIE SCREENING-BAWANDER
